P-IE and SysEB Invasive Species Science Policy Tour

The P-IE and SysEB endorsed science policy study tour, "Invasive Species Security: Protecting Our National Health, Food Supply, and Environment", is now open for applications to participate. Please see the <u>Invasive Species Field Tour website</u> for further details.

This field tour aims to assemble private and public-sector scientists, government representatives, science policy advocates, and policymakers to provide a first-hand understanding of the processes that underlie new species arrivals, establishment, spread, and invasive impact. We will visit the spotted lanternfly quarantine zone to view the damage and spread of this new invasive

pest, and also discuss the significance and management of other invasive species. The tour seeks to understand the resources needed to improve prevention, early detection, rapid response, and the potential for eradication. Additionally, we plan to use the tour to leverage public education and outreach strategies to inform stakeholders about the impact of invasive species and actions that we all can take to slow their occurrence and spread.
